Survey Specialist

Pay Grade: G03

Employment Status: Full-Time

FLSA Status: Non-exempt

Experience Required: Minimum of two (2) years of experience performing surveying work on a land surveying crew. Five (5) years of experience in construction maybe substituted for surveying experience.

Minimum Education Requirements: High School diploma or G.E.D.

Department: Utilities.

Direct Supervisor: Survey Chief.

Supervisory Responsibility: Direct (x); Indirect (x)

Primary Work Location: Work is indoors and outdoors.

Certification: Valid State of Florida driver's license.

Job Summary: Performs sub-professional land surveying work as a member of the survey crew for new construction and layout jobs.

Essential Job Functions

An employee in this position may be called upon to do any or all of the following essential duties:

- Assist in measuring distances; set up auxiliary electronic distance measurement devices; operate level rod to assist in determining ground elevations.
- Open up survey lines through bush and trees to allow measurements along the lines.
- Set survey and control points in the ground such as: stakes, pipes, and monuments.
- Act as rod-man/chainman/instrument person on a survey party.
- Carry equipment as required to support survey operations; load and unload survey vehicles.
- Clean and maintain vehicles and other equipment before and after the workday.
- Research and record information.
- Locate underground City utilities for Sunshine State One-Call line spot tickets.
- Dig and perform other manual labor.
- Meet with utility companies.
- Locate, mark, and stake for plumbing in new construction.
- Assist crews with leak detector.
- Assist with inspection of contractor work and report updates or problem to the supervisor.
- Assist at warehouse with unloading materials as needed.
- Perform other job duties as assigned.

Knowledge, Skills, and Abilities (KSA's) for Position

An employee in this class must have the following knowledge, skills, and abilities upon application:



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Knowledge

- High school mathematics and units of measure.
- Simple surveying and the ability to take care of and learn the care and operation of the equipment.
- City's functions, policies, and procedures.

Skills

- Strong written and oral communications and relational skills.
- Public relations and customer service.
- Follow and relay complex oral and written instructions, policies and procedures.
- Operate a variety of office equipment, including computer terminal, printer, calculator, fax, typewriter, and copier.

Abilities

- Record survey information gathered in the field.
- Perform manual labor outdoors requiring good physical condition.
- Understand water, sewer, streets, and drainage references.
- Work and communicate effectively with various people.
- Work in extreme weather with exposure to dust, dirt, moving equipment, traffic and noises, and uneven or slippery surfaces.

Physical Demands

The work is very heavy work which requires exerting up to 100 pounds of force occasionally, and/or up to 50 pounds of force frequently, and/or up to 20 pounds of force constantly to move objects. The following physical abilities are required:

- Balancing: Maintaining body equilibrium to prevent falling while walking, standing or crouching on narrow, slippery, or erratically moving surfaces. The amount of balancing exceeds that needed for ordinary locomotion and maintenance of body equilibrium.
- Climbing: Ascending or descending ladders, stairs, scaffolding, ramps, poles and the like, using feet and legs and/or hands and arms. Body agility is emphasized.
- Crawling: Moving about on hands and knees or hands and feet.
- Crouching: Bending the body downward and forward by bending leg and spine.
- Feeling: Perceiving attributes of objects, such as size, shape, temperature or texture by touching with skin, particularly that of fingertips.
- Fingering: Picking, pinching, typing, or otherwise working, primarily with fingers rather than with the whole hand as in handling.
- Grasping: Applying pressure to an object with the fingers and palm
- Handling: Picking, holding, or otherwise working, primarily with the whole hand
- Hearing 1: Perceiving the nature of sounds at normal speaking levels with or without correction. Ability to receive detailed information through oral communication, and to make the discrimination in sound.
- Hearing 2: Ability to receive detailed information through oral communication, and to make the discrimination in sound.
- Kneeling: Bending legs at knee to come to a rest on knee or knees.
- Lifting: Raising objects from a lower to a higher position or moving objects horizontally from position-to-position. Occurs to a considerable degree and requires substantial use of upper extremities and back muscles.



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- Mental Acuity: Ability to make rational decisions through sound logic and deductive processes.
- Pulling: Using upper extremities to exert force in order to draw, haul or tug objects in a sustained motion.
- Pushing: Using upper extremities to press against something with steady force in order to thrust forward, downward or outward.
- Reaching: Extending hand(s) and arm(s) in any direction.
- Repetitive Motion: Substantial movements (motions) of the wrist, hands, and/or fingers.
- Speaking: Expressing or exchanging ideas by means of the spoken word including the ability to convey detailed or important spoken instructions to other workers accurately and concisely.
- Standing: Particularly for sustained periods of time.
- Stooping: Bending body downward and forward by bending spine at the waist. Occurs to a considerable degree and requires full motion of the lower extremities and back muscles.
- Talking 1: Expressing or exchanging ideas by means of the spoken word including those activities in which they must convey detailed or important spoken instructions to other workers accurately, loudly, or quickly.
- Talking 2: Shouting in order to be heard above ambient noise level.
- Visual Acuity 1: Have close visual acuity to perform an activity such as: preparing and analyzing data and figures; transcribing; viewing a computer terminal; and/or extensive reading.
- Visual Acuity 2: Including color, depth perception, and field vision.
- Visual Acuity 3: Visual Acuity to determine the accuracy, neatness, and thoroughness of the work assigned or to make general observations of facilities or structures.
- Visual Acuity 4: Have visual acuity to operate motor vehicles and/or heavy equipment.
- Visual Acuity 5: Have close visual acuity to perform an activity such as: visual inspection involving small defects, small parts, operation of machines; using measurement devices; and/or assembly or fabrication parts at distances close to the eyes.
- Walking: Moving about on foot to accomplish tasks, particularly for long distances or moving from one work site to another.
